New Multi-Purpose Greenhouse Enhances Hands-On Learning

The new Future Farmers of America (FFA) building at the local middle school is a promising addition to the educational landscape. The 30ft by 56ft greenhouse emerged from teachers' recognition of the need for more hands-on learning spaces. The project received funding from a variety of donors and organizations, along with an ARCROP grant through the Ohio FFA Foundation.

This versatile structure will extend learning opportunities beyond traditional agricultural boundaries, encompassing horticulture, food production, and mechanical tasks such as small engine work. Hydroponics and succulent cultivation will also be explored, promoting a comprehensive understanding of agriculture.

The greenhouse design, with plants growing along the edges and group benches in the center, facilitates both individual growth and team collaboration. Completion is



anticipated by July, thanks to the hardworking volunteers. Once operational, the greenhouse will offer a robust, hands-on learning environment, enhancing the practical application of classroomacquired knowledge. This marks an exciting leap forward for the FFA program and agricultural education.

Exciting Renovation Underway: CHS Softball Diamond

Construction is underway for the renovation of Clyde High School's softball diamond.

Thanks to the generosity of Joe and Sharon Wilson, the complete overhaul of the facility is now in progress. Local contractors, including Anstead Construction, Fremont Fence, Myers Construction, Miller Pipeline, Gill Electric, and Coach Marc Marshall with his team of volunteers, are working together to bring this project to life.

The renovation involves removing the existing fencing and repurposing the infield turface for the baseball field. The new diamond, expected to be completed by September, will feature a new



scoreboard, a state-of-the-art sound system, and lights from the grass soccer field, allowing for night games. Head coach Marc Marshall expressed gratitude for Mr. Wilson's support, stating, "The softball program is immensely thankful for Mr. Wilson's generosity in creating a state-of-the-art facility. The players and coaches are thrilled."

The community eagerly anticipates the unveiling of this remarkable facility, which will provide an enhanced experience for players, coaches, and spectators. The collaboration among local contractors, volunteers, and the Wilsons demonstrates the community's commitment to providing exceptional opportunities for its youth. Levy

The Clyde-Green Springs Schools district will be presenting a substitute renewal levy on the ballot this coming November. The aim of this levy is to consolidate the existing levies, thereby reducing the frequency of community voting—a step towards alleviating voter fatigue. It's about better planning, not new money.

Here's what you need to know:


- NO NEW MONEY
- Substitute Renewal Levy combines 2 current five year operating levies into one ten year levy
- Alleviate voter fatigue with 10 year term
- Allows us to continue serving our students at the same level
- Allows the district to continue being fiscally responsible through strategic planning




District Financials



As we close in on another fiscal year end, we continue to evaluate our financial status of the district.urrently, we are projecting a budget surplus for this year and next year. The main reason for the surplus is school districts received Emergency Relief Funds from the Federal Government to recover from COVID pandemic. We were able to offset some of the costs from the General Fund by purchasing buses, technology needs and substitute services from those funds. As you can see in the graph below, we project to deficit spend in 2024-2025. Fiscal year 2025 is when the Emergency Relief Funds run out and when our \$1,265,000 Emergency Levy expires. Deficit spending is not sustainable in any situation which is why we have the levy on the ballot this November to help sustain the financial health of the district. The substitute levy this November will combine both the \$539,000 Emergency Levy and \$1,265,000 Emergency Levy to help with voter fatigue at NO NEW TAXES to our tax payers.




Our State Budget represents 52.15% of the revenue which presents an area of concern to the district. The state funding is always uncertain and follows the two-year budget of the state. Three factors that have affected the amount of state funding are: an increase in Federal Adjusted Gross Income, increases in property valuations, and a decline in our enrollment. As those factors continue to trend in those directions our capacity to fund schools increases and our actual funding will decrease. For these reasons, the District continues to evaluate areas which we can operate more efficiently.



The graph below represents the disbursement of the district's expenditures. Our largest are for expenditures are salaries and benefits which represent 77.57% of the district's budget. As our enrollment decreases, the district continues to evaluate all our cost measures to operate as efficiently as possible. Inflation continues to increase at a rate that is unprecedented. In our budget we are trying to get a handle on the inflation as gas prices for our vehicles have just about doubled, utilities are expected to double, and we have seen about a 10% increase in insurance premiums over the past year.

The District has evaluated the enrollment for the future and some areas we have already addressed are:

- As a cost savings, we have taken over filling our substitutes on our own instead of hiring an outside agency.
- Last year, we did not replace an elementary position. In 2024-25, we will not replace two elementary positions after two teachers retire.
- An elective teacher is not going to be replaced this year and will be replaced with a teacher next year for a state mandated class.
- Combined a position at the board office with an attendance position.
- Eliminated an administrative position.



As we continue on the journey, the District will be cognizant of the tax payers' dollars to allow our money to stretch into the future. We look forward to working together as a CommUNITY to provide our students with the best education possible while being mindful of our financial future. Activities & Events

Academics Joe Letterhos, Assistant Superintendent

During the latter part of Spring 2022, our district demonstrated a firm commitment to incorporating evidence-based reading strategies into our instructional practices. This involved a significant investment in both financial and time resources, with the funds exclusively allocated from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. This initiative has allowed us to effectively implement explicit and systematic approaches to instruction that align with the science of reading.

To support this effort, we launched LETRS training for all K-5 teachers and 6-12 Intervention Specialists in Fall 2022, which will run through Spring 2024. LETRS equips educators with the skills necessary to master foundational reading and writing instruction, such as phonological awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, and written language.

In addition to LETRS training, our teachers have also received instruction in Heggerty, a specialized program focusing on phonological awareness. These lessons are designed to be brief, scripted, and engaging. Over the summer, our K-3 teachers will attend a two-day professional development session on Wilson/Fundations, our newly adopted phonics curriculum. This curriculum will be paired with Heggerty to kick off each ELA lesson.

Furthermore, our district Literacy Specialist, along with our Title 1 teachers, underwent training on the use of Acadience as our universal dyslexia screener. This comprehensive training will enable us to accurately identify students at risk for dyslexia, and provide the necessary support and intervention.

We are extremely excited to take our next steps on this journey to improve the district's literacy programs.
